Excitement is growing for the annual meeting of the Florida State Horticultural Society to take place in Daytona Beach, Florida, this June. This year we have a great program for the Citrus Section that will include presentations by state, national, and international scientists. The agenda includes more than 25 oral presentations on several topics: from cultural practices and soil nutrition, to tree physiology and breeding. A focus will be given to cover crops, soil amendments, and citrus nutrition. We will also take a deep look at silicon's impact on citrus performance, salinity, brassinosteroids, gibberellic acid and use of 2,4-D to manage fruit drop.

To conclude our Citrus Section we will cover breeding, with presentations about cold hardy citrus for North Florida, somaclonal variations, Australian limes and more. If you are attending, do not forget to peruse the Poster Section. Posters will cover pest management, post-harvest and fruit quality, and information about the 'Donaldson' tree.

Presenters are already working hard to finalize their slides and posters, and we are looking forward to seeing all of you in June.

Natural Resources & Agroecology Section Field Trip to Deep Creek Preserve

<u>What</u>: **Field Trip to Deep Creek Preserve** – led by Volusia County Land Management

When: Monday, June 12th @ 1:45 p.m.

Meet in the lobby at 1:45 to depart for Deep Creek Preserve. Plan to drive your own vehicle or carpool. The drive is approximately 40 minutes and we have a presentation and tour planned at 2:30 pm. We will meet our guide at the entrance of the preserve.



Where: 964 S. State Road 415, New Smyrna Beach, FL, 32168

Description:

The 8,040-acre Deep Creek Preserve includes natural and agricultural features. Two acquisitions make up this site — the first, a cattle and silviculture ranch purchased with funds from Volusia Forever and Volusia County Water and Utilities in 2010 as a key component toward the goal of acquiring a connected wildlife greenway through the Volusia Conservation Corridor. A naturally wet site, the plant communities of Deep Creek Preserve include dome swamps, basin swamps, wet and mesic flatwoods. Three trails traverse the preserve and all are open to hiking, bicycling, and horseback riding during the daylight hours. While exploring it, you may identify these distinct natural communities by the presence of certain trees and plants. Wildlife on the site may include deer, turkey, black bear, otter, fox, bobcat, coyote, Sherman's fox squirrel, gopher tortoise, bald eagle, swallow tailed kite, and wading birds. Participants should wear comfortable walking shoes, sunscreen, bug spray and water.
